EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Overview

One of the biggest challenges for consumers of entertainment today is the constantly growing options of entertainment platforms each with their own exclusive, ever-expanding catalog of content. From the user's standpoint it is not only expensive, but also increasingly challenging to search for and decide what to watch, listen to, or read.

Our team set out to study consumer behavior to understand how they select content, what factors influence their decision-making process and how the myriad of options available affects their experience of entertainment content.

Our ultimate goal is to develop a solution that would hopefully alleviate users' frustrations and improve their digital entertainment experience.



Problem Space

When consuming entertainment content, users face challenges and decision-fatigue related to irrelevant recommendations, feeling frustrated when they can't find anything to watch and spending too much time searching for what to watch between different services.

Goals / UX Methods

We conducted interviews with five users to gain insight into the context, choices and frustrations when it came to engaging with entertainment content. Our research revealed four main themes:

- People feel they spend a significant amount of time scrolling through apps before ultimately deciding on content.
- Users find the process of discovering new entertainment options overwhelming and are generally dissatisfied with the recommendations provided by app algorithms and rely more on suggestions from friends and family.
- Consumers want a better way to choose content that would appeal to a group.
- Users have individualized methods of keeping track of content availability across their subscriptions.

As a result of these insights our team plans to develop a content aggregation service that would offer a compelling user experience when interacting, searching and discovering content across multiple platforms.

Hypothesis

With a myriad of digital entertainment options, people experience decision fatigue attempting to sift through all of them and want a way to streamline the process.

Initial Problem Statement

How might we support people experiencing decision fatigue when faced with multiple entertainment options?

Assumptions

- People experience decision fatigue from having an endless amount of entertainment options.
- People have no time to be able to find entertainment options.;
- People hate having to go to multiple sites to have to watch things.;
- People have the desire to expand beyond their entertainment comfort zone but find it difficult.
- People want to learn more about their current interests.

Revised Problem Statement

Insight	In today's age, consumers are bombarded with content throughout a variety of apps.
Problem / Persona	As a result, Quentin finds it tedious and time consuming to sift through content across multiple apps.
Goal	How might we streamline the experience of choosing and discovering content across multiple platforms to alleviate decision fatigue?

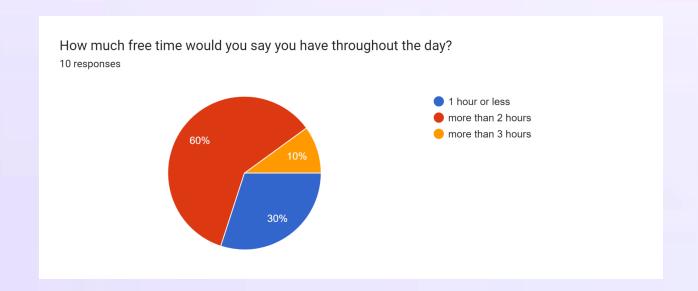


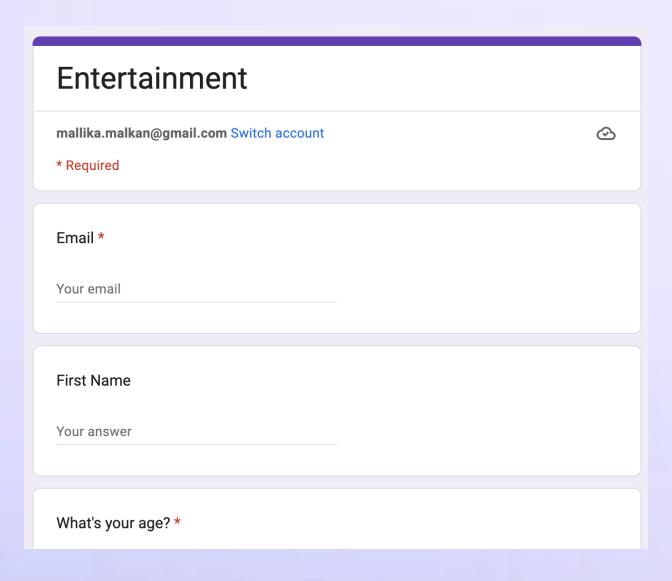












DISCUSSION GUIDE

Overview

In order to understand how people currently consume digital entertainment, we conducted 5 interviews. For each interview we followed a script and asked all participants the same questions to ensure we had consistent data.

Key Quotes

Ethan

[in regards to friends and family recommendations] "Definitely, because they know me the best and they know the type of person I am and therefore they can definitely point me in the right direction if I'm looking for a new show or movie."

Tony

"I guess the mood stays the same...I suppose if you're in a bad mood you would want them to line you up. Right? And even in a good mood always you want to watch something - So you're always trying to watch something good"

Salil

"...for me like every time I watch something on any I guess like any of those networks, or apps, like they try to give me more content that's like in that genre, which is fine like that's not necessarily bad. I just want to watch a good movie or a good TV show. And like I'd actually like I'm not that genre specific."

Derin

"...most of the time when I look through recommendations, I'm like, I already know what all these shows are and I've either watched them to some degree or I've already decided that I don't really care about watching them."

Ralph

"The only reason I will start watching your shows if someone recommended it to me directly, so not through the recommendation system of the app, but a friend"

RESEARCH SYNTHESIS

Overview

Based on our interviews, we distilled key information into an affinity map. This helped up pinpoint trends and patterns that will inform our design features moving forward. Following the affinity map, we created a persona and journey map - these helped us understand our users on a personal level and understand when and where our product could be integrated into their daily lives.

I have a good amount of free time. I mean, at work, I have like, an hour, at least during the day and then when I get home, I mean, I have like, six hours plus like an hour in the morning, I guess. So. Yeah, gap hours kind of, minus sleep and work.

The time depends on the month. But I mean, I'm generally free at night on the weekdays, and unless something is very wrong, usually not working on the weekend.

Coding or sports like just any, like hobbies that, you know, I try to find productivity. Yeah. [and] Through watching the show? Watching the show.

4. Do you use any apps or websites for engaging with your entertainment preferences?

I'm subscribed to Netflix,

I use like mostly YouTube for like watching things. I'll use like Crunchyroll. And then there's like another streaming service that does like other like specific stuff called drop out which is another one that I that I watch, but I just the other ones unless there's like a specific show somebody has told me to watch.

Like why would you say you would use for instance, Netflix? What would you say you prefer, using the website? The app?

For me, I just use the app [Netflix] because I find it more convenient, I suppose. I can't really have it open on my browser because most of the time, that's where I would either do my hobbies whether it'd be coding or schoolwork, something like that. So I would always have an iPhone or something because a tablet is just really convenient for like, smaller stuff. As much importance, I guess you could say.

What other sort of apps are you subscribed to?

Like, I mean, as far as stuff I want. Like we have access to Netflix, Hulu, Disney, HBO sometimes we have Apple TV sometimes not depending on if there's a film we want to watch there. I also subscribe to YouTube. Like premium that I subscribe to a lot more recently, maybe just like six months ago. Or something like that. So that's kind of like a new thing for me. That's also like that's really different. Like I like watching YouTube, kind of like it's just like a different like thing for me like I don't usually watch that and I actually watch YouTube maybe like in the morning like when I'm like drinking coffee, or I will have stuff on YouTube. Like during the day like while I'm working. Like I'll put like, kind of like like music concerts or like, stuff like that like stuff I can watch passively while I'm

working on there. And then like in terms of like, are you guys interested in other forms of entertainment? Like other than TV?

Well, I said I'm subscribed to Netflix, but I don't have many subscriptions myself. And my brother and my mom. They use Hulu and stuff. Netflix,...

How do you feel about these apps or websites' recommendation features?

I'd say [Netflix] is pretty up there. Yeah. I know, it has some algorithm or way of seeing what a user would or wouldn't like based on its past choices, and I'd say it's pretty spot on. Every show that I've picked from its recommendations is pretty good. Or I move on of course.

I mean, yeah, it depends. So I'm a big basketball fan. So I watch a lot of NBA basketball at night. In that, I watch like both like using like my Apple TV, as well as my computer. Sometimes my iPad if I want to like lay in bed or something like that, and then I watched like, I don't have cable, but like we have all of like pretty much all the streaming services or like I guess I'll call the major ones. So I watch like, like just TV shows and movies on that. I usually watch on TV. I generally don't use like my computer or an iPad for that.

They're fine. I mean, like I feel like the things I've seen the recommendations are always like, stuff I would have heard about anyway. Because they're like really popular shows. So which like sometimes I do enjoy watching and sometimes it is like kind of tailored but most of the time when I look through recommendations, I'm like, I already know what all these shows are and I've either watched them to some degree or I've already decided that I don't really care about watching them. So I don't really use the recommended features kind of ever.

Usually, I - It's not that I prefer any app. It's more that I want to watch a certain show that is only on some app. But I think lately, HBO Max has been kind of

where a lot of the shows and watching are on. So yeah, I guess we could go with that.

I think for streaming shows I definitely, like I sometimes use it like for Netflix. I'm like, oh, I want to just turn my brain off and put something on the TV but I generally don't really use them because I generally try to say okay, I'm watching this show, which I don't need recommendations for. I think for music. Like I think that's a much bigger thing for me like for Spotify. I used to be way more regular about this, but I usually try to check my Discover Weekly for example, just to see what's on there.

5. How much of your free time do you spend trying to find new things to watch/read/listen? How do you discover new material to watch/read/listen to?

I would say mostly through friends and family, like pure recommendations, not from Netflix's recommendations because as good as the algorithm is, it doesn't really know you. So it only knows what you watch and you can't really make an assumption.

Honestly, I don't know. I guess through recommendations from friends, and family stuff. Of course, suddenly, I'm interested otherwise I'm like whatever.

Probably like a lot like I want to say, like if I already have like a show that I'm like into then like, that's easy, right? Like, just go to the next episode. But if I don't have something like that, then I ended up probably spending like, you know, just like 15 minutes 20 minutes like scrolling through stuff. And like switching between apps to like, find something. Yeah, so it's like, I don't know. Like, I don't know exactly what always like catches my eye. But again, it could be a combination of like, have I heard of the thing before? Like, pick a recommendation from somebody that read about it. Did I or maybe it's like an actor that I'm like, super into? I'll give you an example. Like after I've watched White Lotus season two. I was like, man, Aubrey Plaza is so good. I just want to watch more stuff with Aubrey Plaza. Then I watch like three Aubrey Plaza movies. But like that was not a recommendation. I had to like search word or something like that.

I think for shows generally. The only reason I will start watching your shows like if someone recommended it to me directly, so not through the recommendation system of the app, but like a friend is like, oh my gosh, like this recommendation or I see. I see it on Twitter. Or something like that. For things like movies, I think I do more research on my own. So like, I'll go look at lists of movies from directors that I like, for example, and then make a list and then see what apps they're on and they're available, and when the apps like I'll go through movies like that.

6. How do you feel about recommendations given by some apps you use?

I would say friends and family have a stronger deciding factor. But yeah, both definitely have an impact.

It's kind of invasive, honestly. Because I mostly use youtube. And then sometimes I'm just thinking about some random shit and it appears in my feed. So that's the basis of it. And it's not just due to like - let's be honest, it's everywhere. Yeah, like ads. It's kind of annoying.

do you engage with the recommended content?

No, because I want it to stop. So I don't

That's an interesting question. I actually find I mean, like recommendations are always like, though, I guess it depends on the product. Some products are better than others. Like I want to say that maybe Netflix has like pretty good recommendations. And then versus like when I look at like HBO or like Hulu. Generally, I feel like the recommendations they're like really aren't as like, solid. And even in Netflix, I think like, there's a lot of room for improvement. But I feel like for me like every time I watch something on any I guess like any of those networks, or apps, like they try to give me more content that's like in that genre, which is fine like that's not necessarily bad. But I feel like for me like I just want to watch a good movie or a good TV show. And like I'd actually like I'm not that genre specific. So like sometimes I wish there was a way to just give me recommendations just based on like I was just like, how could he just filter out stuff that's just like like mediocre? You could say you're just not that good. And I'd like just show me like the hits. like, show me like that. Stuff that like maybe

won awards or like it's like super, like popular like something like that. Like I think that would be like better for me.

Um, because the things I watch aren't necessarily like, always, consistent in a certain way. So the recommendations are like, I feel like they're not pulled from like, like, I don't know, it's like, oh, I watched thing A and then I watched totally different thing B or something and then the recommendation might be like, either exactly, like one of those are just like because they're so different. Just like seems kind of random.

Yeah, I mean, like, me and my girlfriend usually like watching TV together. If I'm watching TV, and we've definitely just been like, oh, I have no idea what to watch. Let's just scroll on Netflix. And I think it's kind of hit or miss like some sometimes will, you know, show starting show and I'll like I'll watch the first few episodes and like, I won't really like it. And then I stopped and drop off. Sometimes the movies are pretty entertaining. So I think yeah, I think it's kind of hit or miss.

7. What time do you consume media/entertainment, and why?

Throughout the day, watching is usually like only the evening.

How does time of day influence what you may watch/read/listen to?

So random times, honestly, [for podcasts] because I always have my headphones in, even in class, especially if it's boring. Class and stuff like that.

Not really. I think it's like mostly about like, just when I'm when I'm available. I mean, I guess there is sort of like Oh, I'm gonna watch the thing scary. It's fun to do at night, you know, but she's like, kind of like a typical thing, but I don't think I've noticed any patterns with other stuff.

Yeah, usually like after work, or if I Yeah, if I don't have plans like on the weekend, generally probably at night, too. Yeah, I think usually if I'm watching something afterwards, it's either a TV show that I'm following, like the sopranos or something like that. Or if I will watch a movie. It's not going to be that intense like I'm not going to watch it three hour movie after I finish work, if it's a weekday so yeah, I do think it has an influence. Probably the most influence

would be like length or just like the topic you know, like I don't want to watch something super like sad if I just finished work.

8. What devices do you use to consume your primary form of entertainment?

Overall with the iPad. [because of the convenience with screen real estate type of thing]

Mostly my phone and my laptop sometimes. [For] convenience as it's always on me.

Usually, for listening, it's like usually my phone and for washing, it's usually my laptop.

We have a TV in our living room and it has smart TV like apps built in. Yeah, usually for like longer for TV shows and movies for sure. If I'm watching like a YouTube video or something, I'll probably watch it down on my phone unless it's like a long video.

9. How much of your time-consuming entertainment is spent with friends or family?

Maybe like an hour, so not too much.

Varies, I guess. I don't know, like 30 minutes a day I suppose. Like at night

Like most movies or TV shows, I'll watch with my fiancee basketball like I just watched it's usually like me and maybe like a friend. And then like, you know, other stuff like music and podcasts and stuff like that. That's also it's like a solo activity for the most part.

Probably a few hours a week. So there's like a few TV shows I'm following I guess like two right now. It's a few hours right there and then. Yeah, maybe? Yeah, usually that I'd say it varies, and then a few TV upsets, some TV shows, and then maybe a movie.

10. Do you usually listen to friends' or family's recommendations on new things to watch/read/listen to?

Definitely, because they know me the best and they know the type of person I am and therefore they can definitely point me in the right direction if I'm looking for a new show or movie.

Yeah, for sure...I think I prefer it because I've never really been satisfied with the algorithmic recommendations. But if that was better then I could see myself finding other stuff to watch too. But I think I prefer I think I do prefer recommendations from people because they sort of know me better than an algorithm does.

Yeah, definitely. I just feel like there's like so much content out there these days. And there's just like so much to sift through that like, you know, if you get a recommendation from somebody like that usually like go list at the top of the list. Just because like now I- you know, at least have like one data point on like, it being something that I would probably enjoy. And that's that would say that's like, way more trustworthy than like, any sort of like algorithmic recommendation. Like, as soon as like, somebody else recommends you something, especially someone you know, well, like, you know, there's like a, there's like an element there of like, you know, maybe you want to like talk about it with them or like, maybe you just know, like, it affected them in a certain way. So you want to see, like that point of view. So just in general, like as soon as you have, like a recommendation, it's like there's just like a much stronger connection there. Versus if it's algorithmic then it's just like you know, I don't know, it's like, that's fine, but like, the algorithm is also telling me to watch like a 100 other things, right.

Usually Yeah, I'm usually very open. Like if a good friend is like, Oh my God, this TV shows coming out. It's really cool. Yeah, I usually like ended up checking it out. That happened with The Last of Us for example. I had a friend who had played the game and they were like, Oh my gosh, this shows coming down. And like now I'm watching it.

11. Do you share your recommendations with your friends or family?

I know my friends and family but my personality is just the type to not really give suggestions because I suppose I don't want to give a bad one or I just don't want to lead them down the wrong path or the wrong way. So I'd just have to give them a variety of options, not recommend a specific one.

To watch? Sometimes I guess, if I'm - if I really like a show or something, I'll be like, you know, check this out. But I don't most of the time. Then I'm gonna watch it.

I mean, yeah, like, I don't know, like, if I recommend something to friends or family, hopefully, they want to watch it but I don't know. You have to ask them.

yeah, I think it's it's the show or the movies like good like I'll usually you know, I think it usually just comes up saying oh, you know, where are you watching these days that sort of come?

12. What is your decision-making process for choosing what to listen/read/watch?

I guess the best way to answer that would be it's down to preference at the end - right? of who you are. So me personally I mostly prefer TV shows as they have more of a storyline compared to movies. There's a lot of builds, character development, or just builds up to a specific scene or event that ties everything together - all the episodes and that's what I really find valuable, I guess

I don't know. I just, you know, click the ops and see what happens. Like I can't give you an intricate response.

Do any external factors influence this decision-making process? Does your mood play a role in the process?

I wouldn't say my mood plays a role. Maybe hobbies or something of those interests that I have so I may obviously find it interesting, which is why I would like to approach, you know, a new movie to use or maybe even like the actors. Maybe you just like the actors and you just want to watch what they've created. I usually go around that route. Yeah.

Not really, I guess the mood stays the same...I suppose if you're in a bad mood you would want them to line you up. Right? And even in a good mood always

you want to watch something - So you're always trying to watch something good, right? Yeah.

I don't know. I guess it really just like maybe depends on like, my mood. And just like, you know, kind of like what's going on for me like if I'm really like, stressed out or something like that. Like then I might, like, look for something that's like funnier. And like lighthearted, something I don't have to, like, pay as much attention to, but if I'm like, you know, maybe I'm just in like a, like, you know, I really want to like get into a movie or something like that or get into like a story then like, I'll look for something that's a little bit more kind of like, you know, just like deeper, more interesting. But yeah, I mean, I guess I also just have like, certain like genres that I like, like I like, sort of like I like dark comedies. I like drama as I like. I like action stuff. Like I don't really like horror. I don't really like musicals. There's just certain genres I just like to avoid too.

Oh, for sure. Yeah...I think a lot of the stuff I listened to are, comfort shows that I can do anytime. But watching things. If I'm feeling, sentimental or I'm feeling sad or something then I probably want to watch something serious, I feel like I tend to like match my mood as opposed to going the opposite way to try you know, like, I usually don't. Funny stuff when I'm like feeling sad. I like, the sadder side of things. And same with like, funny, light-hearted stuff.

For deciding to watch Yeah, I think it kind of depends, like for shows. I guess. You know, it's like, if it's like a really famous show, like the Sopranos. I just kept hearing about it over and over and I'm like, Okay, I guess I should watch this show. Apparently, it's really good. So it's like if it's been strongly recommended by other people. Or if something about the plot is pretty interesting to me. Like I'll go out of my way to watch it. Then yeah, for movies, for movies, I tend to go more there's a certain directors that I like, so you know, if I like one movie from a director, and I like their, you know, style, I'd be like, Oh, I should check it out. So, that's usually how it goes for that.

I think it's kind of similar to like the length and like the energy level like, I don't know, I'm not gonna go watch like a really sad three-hour long movies like I you know, not feeling great already. Like my mood isn't great. Yeah, I think I think so.

13. Is there anything you prefer to entertain yourself with alone versus with other people? What is driving this preference?

I don't really. No.

Yeah, I mean, most of the time I watch basketball by myself just because it's like, it's just easier, like one I mean, I've followed the Philadelphia 76 series, which is like an East Coast team. They actually like start typically, start playing around like 4pm Pacific because I live in San Francisco that like actually like I'll watch that a lot like passively like I'll put it on like my second monitor while I'm like still working. And like I just play kind of like checking on the game as I'm like doing other stuff. And then like I mean, just like generally like you know, if it's like a big game I'll get together with friends you know, there's like a playoff there's a final or something like that because then I know like, other people are going to be like interested in it. But like, you know, just like going out, like meeting up with people like for like, just like a casual like when Wednesday night game or something like that. Like, it's just, you know, it's just like a lot of work to do that. So it's not really it's just, you know, it's just not something I'm looking to do. Here. Yeah.

Sometimes it depends on the person. I don't really watch anything that I feel like I mean, you know, the like, two-hour episode Dungeons and Dragons thing that I watched like, I'm probably not gonna watch that with somebody in a sitting, but like if it's a show like I don't think the genre or like the mood of the show, necessarily. It just depends on like, if the if I could watch anything with anybody who is interested in watching that thing, probably

I think I usually like to watch, especially TV shows and music with other people. Because then, like, you know, it'll be kind of like a bonding point or like something we could talk about later, like, Oh, like that, you know, this part. of the movie was crazy. Like, that's everything. But yeah, I mean, like, I think some movies. If it's a really heavy movie or something maybe I don't want to watch it with other people. I think it kind of depends, but usually, I like watching other people.

14. What kinds of entertainment experiences do you like to share with friends and family?

It's pretty inconvenient to use a phone for people watching, so usually a TV.

Family, I really don't. Usually, sometimes maybe like a movie but yeah, that's pretty rare. Yeah.

How do you make an entertainment decision with multiple people?

With friends and family will be kind of difficult to make everybody happy? So you would have to choose, probably a classic everybody's watched already. Then you would have to kind of be in a disagreement about what to watch. I suppose. That's why I try to to watch every single one - So just try to make sure that everybody overall is satisfied.

Depends on the people. If I'm on like, one person right then I'm like just pick one. I can control that situation. You would just pick one and get on with it, but it's like a group of people then they're - in a way, you are waiting for them to finish. you are - so it's dependent on them? Yeah, but on my own watching, I'm on board.

With friends, um, I guess there are some like if it's like a really silly like, like, reality TV type thing. Like, I can't watch that stuff by myself. Like freaks me out. But I love watching stuff like that with other people. Yeah. But for anything else, like I think I mean, I think with friends I gravitate more towards stuff we can watch that like, we can also like, like chat about during, you know? Yeah, I don't know. Yeah.

what would you say is an example of a show words or movies or any sort of entertainment that I guess, meet everyone's needs?

Most likely a comedy I suppose. You know, I'd say comedy is pretty safe. Because I want to save choice. Yeah. Yes.

I don't know. We just you know, open Netflix and click like the first interesting thing that pops up or I like to rewatch shows but that's just me. Yeah. I really like Rick and Morty. I don't care how many times I've watched them so it's still fun to me. Yeah, so if I'm too lazy to go on find like something new. I fucking go back to - that makes sense.

Yeah. I mean, I would say just like if I'm watching with people, like whether it's like sports or movies or whatever like you want to, you want to maybe just like pick something that like everyone's going to enjoy. So like, there's certain like types of like, movies that like, I know, like my fiance and I will like both enjoy together. Like, though I can't put like my finger on it exactly. But like, if I see it, like we kind of know like, oh, that's something like both like, or, like, you know, like with friends. Like it might just depend on I mean, I guess like the same thing like you might just like kind of like as you're trying to pick something just like figure out like, what is something that like you'll both like really like the group will really like. It also could be like, you know, a few weeks ago like my brother wanted to sell me a movie. He had seen it before and it was one of his favorites. So like, you know, we watched it together, and like I was just like, Okay, I'm gonna watch this because like, my brother really like was into it. So like, let me check it out too. Like that. Was kind of the deal.

I mean, I think I'll, I'll usually consider like the taste of the people who are there like like, you know, I probably wouldn't go out of my way to watch something really weird. Like with my mom but maybe I would die if it's just like my friends. So yeah, I think usually like, their tastes like you know, when my mom is like, Okay, we're gonna watch a Marvel movie or something. Yeah, yeah, basically, their taste.

15. How much time do you spend looking for something to watch/read/listen? Why?

A pretty short amount of time. I don't really want to use too much of my time looking for a show that I might not even end up not liking. So the way I see it with Netflix, Netflix's algorithms, what they recommend, sometimes it can be good. If it's bad, just move on to the next one.

I don't know. Five minutes. I guess. I can't really give you a really quantitative answer. It's just random.

If I had no recommendation, I'm just looking for something new. Like maybe 20 minutes or something at most.

Discovering something new?

Mostly it's kind of tedious because I'm not into a lot of stuff out there. But usually, when I find something that's interesting, it's like a pleasant surprise.

Listening to is easy because I have like a very like, you know, a set of things that like come out with the new stuff pretty regularly so I don't I'm not usually spending too much time trying to find something new to listen to. For watching, I guess like again, at least with the big ones like I don't spend too much time searching because usually, I go in with somebody who has told me to watch something. So maybe like, but if there's a time where I'm like, Oh, I just want to find something and I'll search on maybe try for like 20 minutes to look for something. And now give up or go to something that I already know.

Yeah, I mean, again, I really like depends, like, if I'm watching like a movie or TV show by myself like, then again, like maybe like those 15 or 20 minutes I talked about like, just like revenue, sit down and trying to figure it out. podcasts like I don't really like look for podcasts like I just have like maybe like five or six I'm subscribed to and so every time they have a new episode, I listen to them but I generally like don't get new podcasts very often. Maybe just like once in a while if I hear about something that somebody recommends or like uh, you know, just like saw it online or something like that, like add a new one to my like my list but that's pretty rare. And then music like I mean, I would say music kind of sits in like two categories. Like there's like one like stuff that's just like light for a really, really long time. Like stuff I listened to in like high school, college etc. And like, it's just like a part of like, they're like, by library, and I'll just like draw on an album. And then like, but then there's also like, you know, like that gets boring after a while, right? And so you want to listen to something new. And in that case, like it's actually like, I don't really have a great system for it. Like, I've actually found it generally like, like, both easy and difficult to find new music like it's easy in the sense that like Spotify, makes that super available, right? Like anything you want to listen to, it's like right there, but like to actually find something new, like on my own that, like I'm gonna maybe like get super into is like, you know, I feel like it's like random. You just gotta like, listen to like a bunch of playlists like a bunch of like no radio stations eventually they'll be fine something like I don't know that I have like a great system there for like really like, like finding something new. So, yeah, I mean, more recently, like, I've actually also been listening to a lot of music on YouTube. And then listen to like,

like live DJ shows. And that's another thing where I'm just like, I just find like a random person I started listening to and like, I just hope I like it and I don't like it, you know, move on to something else.

Oh, I think like not too much. But like, I do it somewhat regularly. Like, if you know, I have like, for example, for podcasts. I have like, several that I listened to, but if like none of the recent episodes sounded interesting. Maybe I'll go scroll on the podcasts on Spotify and see if anything's interesting. Like for movies. I actually keep a list of movies that I want to watch for music. There are a few websites that I like to visit every now and then to see like oh, is anything cool? releasing soon? Like maybe one of the artists that I really like is releasing an album. So yeah, I think like fairly regularly.

Does that change if you're with people?

Yeah, sometimes this then I might just let somebody else decide. Like, I'll suggest a couple of things and, you know, just kind of let somebody like, take over if they have like something that they would want to watch.

16. What was a recent negative experience you had when choosing something to watch read listen to?

No, no, no, no. So the algorithm has been doing okay, so far. Yeah.

I wouldn't say their negatives, inconvenient.

I don't think it's ever been any worse than Oh, I didn't find anything. So I'll just go back to this thing that I kind of always watched or something I think at worst, it's like I just didn't find anything particularly.

What makes it inconvenient?

Just finding something good. That's new. That's inconvenient, but it's not really negative. Because you know, this is a show

Yeah, I mean, I think I think the negative experience is just like like not having a lot of like, like direction. Again, I think like in all these categories like there's like, there's just so much content available. But their music or whatever that like it's hard to know where to start. And like having a little bit more clarity on like,

where to start would be really nice. Like especially I think in music this is like important. So like I just like in general I don't listen to that much like electronic music or like, I don't listen to that many DJs or anything. So like I just I'm not super familiar with like, really what's out there. And so I guess like, you know, it would be cool. I mean, now I'm just like brainstorming but like, it'd be cool if there was a way to just be like, hey, like, you're just getting into this genre. Like, here's 10 people maybe to like start with versus just like right now I'm just like, I find like a random person. I'm like, is this person good? Like, I don't know, like, are they well known? I don't know. Like, I had no idea. And like, I guess I could like do that research, right? Like, you could like sit down and like, there's like, articles, I'm sure written about that type of stuff. But like, I don't feel like I want to do that right at the time for that like it feels like more like easily accessible. Just like it could be. It doesn't have to be an article but like, just some way to get like, kind of like a shortlist really quickly, based on like, quality or like something like that, like that would be cool.

Yes, Spotify, I mean, for you know, for. For music, I use Spotify a lot. This is kind of embarrassing but I go to pitchfork. Yeah, that's it for music.

I would say it's like, wow, that was totally negative. It's more like wow, that wasn't as good as I thought it is. Yeah, it's like, oh, you know, as an artist, their new releases new album, I listened to it, and it's like, not as good as your last album. And, you know, it's not like, you know, negative, that's just like, you know, that's that sucks. It's not as good as the last.

17. What was a recent positive experience you had when choosing something?

Yeah, I'd say it's done a great job. Like clearly it knows that target audience when it gives me the shows or movies that it recommends, and then also I do have my friends and family that are recommended, so it's damn near impossible for them to point me in the wrong direction. I guess.

It's pretty positive. Yeah. It's one of the biggest streaming platforms for movies and TV shows. So overall, it's pretty good. Clearly, they're doing something right.

Sure. Yeah. That's leisure time, so it's always positive. Yes, yeah. I don't know if it's a good answer. It's kind of a weird answer, but I never really had - I don't get bad - trying to watch a movie or to find a movie to watch.

I mean, yeah, like trying to take a look at a specific example. Movies, I can't I can't think of anything in particular with music, like I found, again, it's like random, but like, I definitely see Jay read again, that I like to listen to him a lot.

I feel like the most positive variance is finding out something I like has new episodes that I'd like didn't know until I like was looking for stuff and then it's like, oh, new episodes and I'm like what I didn't know that and I can jump into that.

I think so. There's a podcast that I found recently. That's been super interesting. It's about the history of certain businesses, which sounds nerdy but is like a pretty good listen on the train. So yeah, that was basically like, Oh, I was just scrolling. And, like, I remember reading about this podcast and then I saw it on Spotify. And was like, oh, actually go check out an episode. So yeah, I never really like it says as a pretty positive experience.

18. How do you keep track of new episodes or lists across different platforms?

I don't use something like concrete. I kind of just like remember or forget, I don't use any like tools or I don't. Yeah, like any sort of track or anything. Yeah. And I don't even like usually use notification systems that are on when it says like, oh, notify me. I almost like never use those.

Yeah, I use this app called letterbox. Yeah, I think it's pretty cool. Basically, you say, Oh, I've watched this movie. Then you give it a rating. And then that's how I keep track of stuff every scene. And then usually, you know, like, after watching a movie, I'll go like on lists where that movies on because like users can make lists of movies.

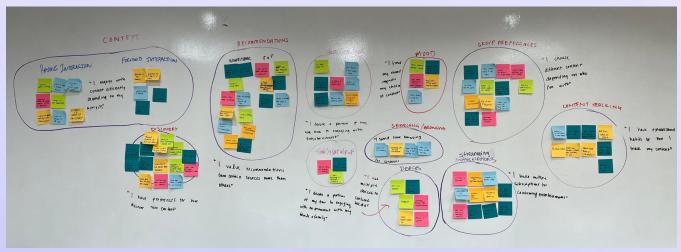
Overview

He and his friends always discuss the latest episode over a drink. His girlfriend however doesn't like that show, so they watch something else when they're watching tv together. They usually scroll for 15-20 minutes before giving up and deciding to rewatch something they've both seen before. 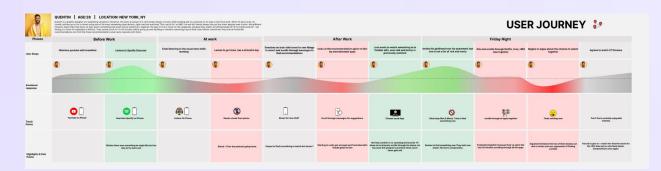

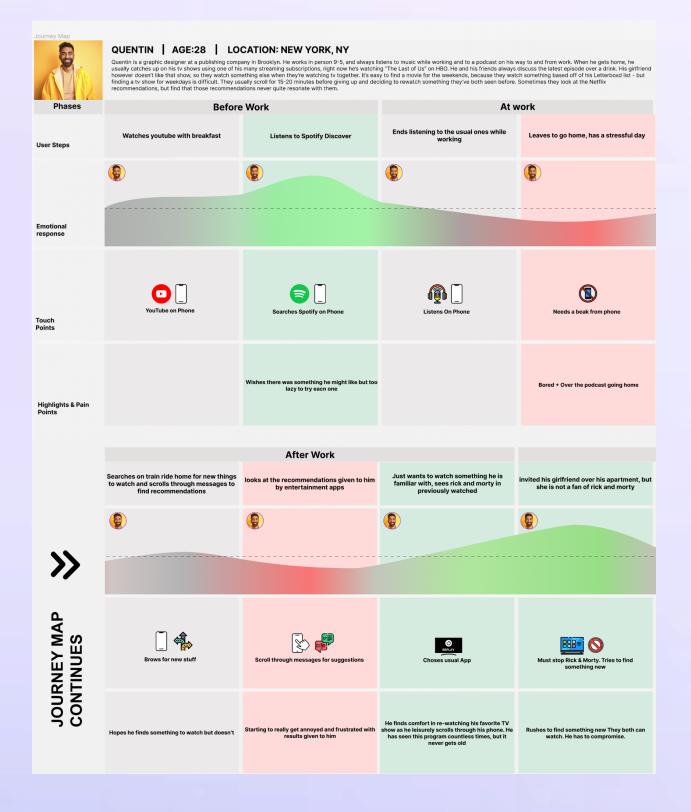

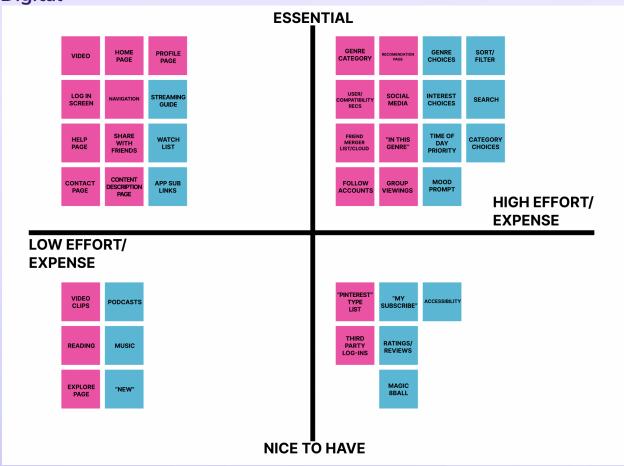

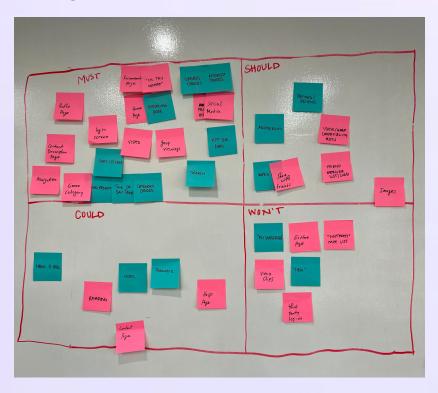

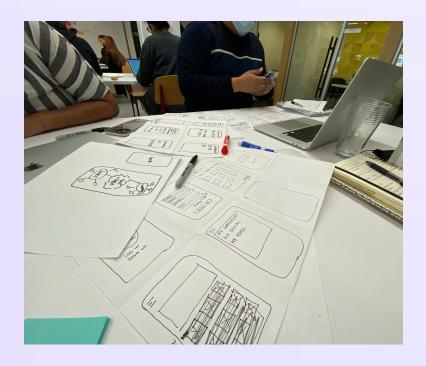
Methodology

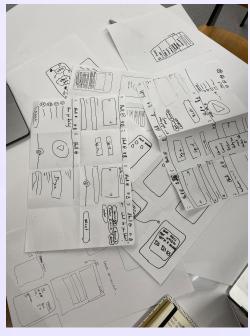

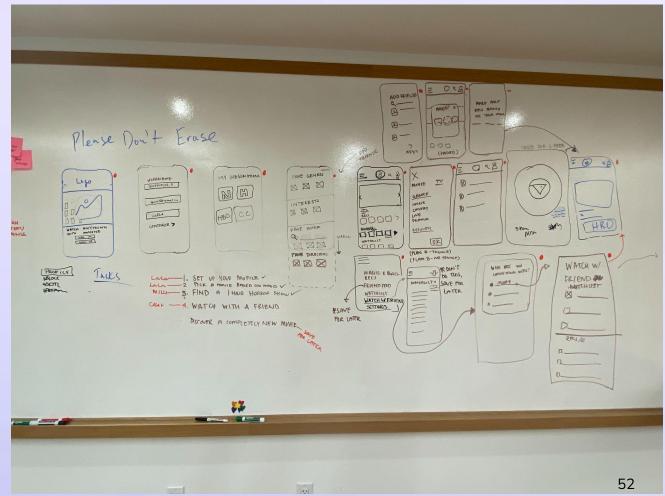
Key Takeaways

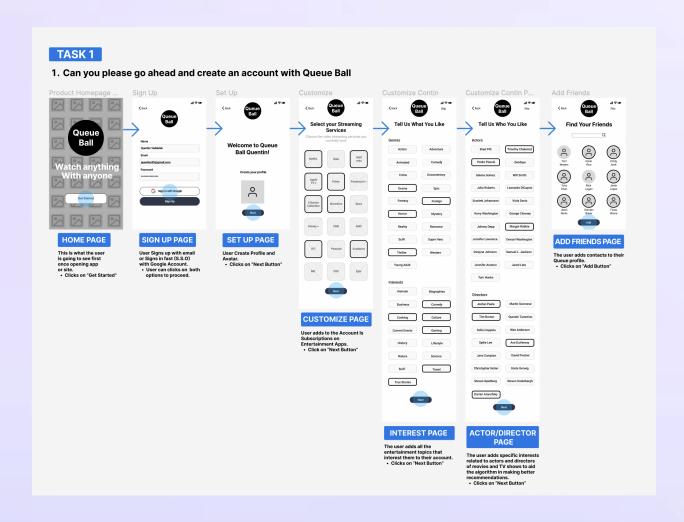


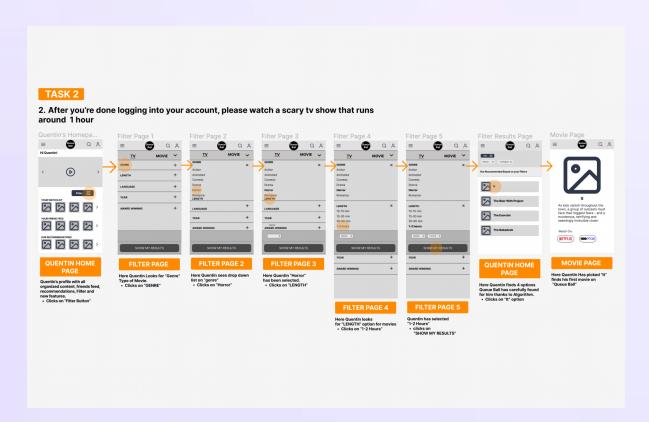


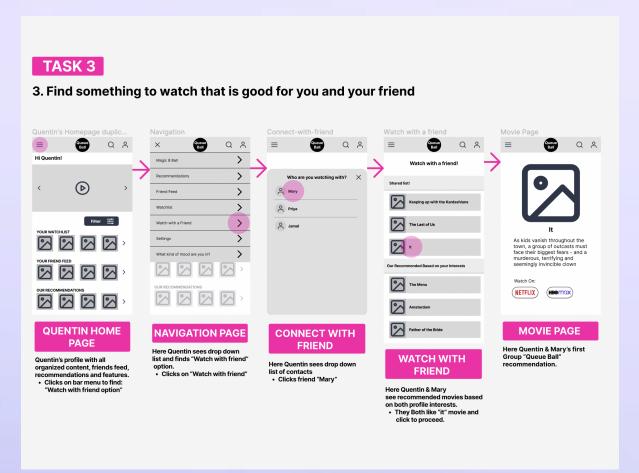

Overview

The mid-fidelity prototype gives us insight into how to visualize the app navigation, where the features live, and how to design it to be intuitive for prospective users. By creating this prototype we can perform usability testing which will give us key information as to what is successful and what needs work in our current design and navigation. Ultimately, this helps us pinpoint problem area and validate design decisions before moving onto development and hi-fi prototyping.

Methodology

We created a mid-fidelity prototype that accounts for layout, font and button size, placements, and visual navigation. We did this by creating tasks for users to test out later, each member developed the frames necessary for carrying out the task. We created all of our frames within one figma file and collaborated to ensure a smooth prototype.

 - 1 User directly navigated to task
 - 2/5 Users indirectly navigated to task

Analysis of of testing

- Multiple users assumed the "Watch with a friend" feature was a remote viewing feature as opposed to a physical feature.
- Navigating outside of the "mood recommended movie feature" proved to be difficult for multiple users.
- Multiple users showed enthusiasm towards the Queue ball user sign in form.
 They enjoy having a filter system that caters to their likings.
- Some users had difficulty returning to the homepage after reaching the movie page
- Multiple users mentioned they thought that they could complete the task of "watching with a friend" through the "Friend Feed" feature on the homepage.

Recommendations

- Add "close out" and "back" buttons to the recommendations and watch with friends page
- Include the "filter" feature onto the navigation
- Increase the size for the "filter" button on Quentin's homepage.
- Differentiate color of "filter" button compared to the rest of the page
- Include the mood button inside of the navigation bar
- Rephrase "Watch with a friend" into a accurate description of viewing together in a physical space
- Increase font size in the movie page to give clarity to user
- Add texture to "streaming apps" within movie page to indicate to users that button navigate

Multiple users clicked on the "friend feed" feature on the homepage when given the task of watching with a friend.	Allow users the ability to get to that path when clicking in the friend feed feature on the designated homepage.

Overview

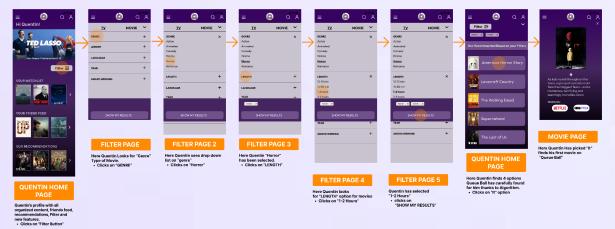

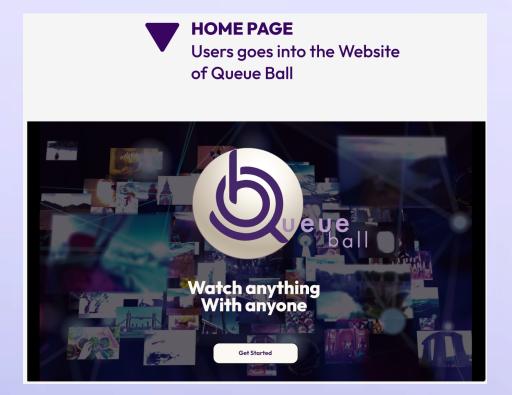
Overview

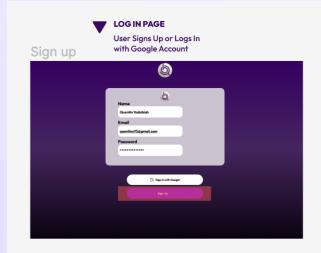

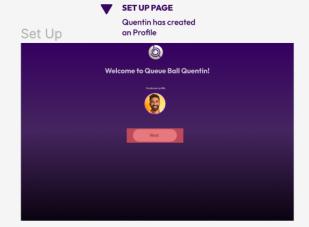
Methodology

USABILITY TESTING ROUND 2

Overview

By implementing the updated design features based off of the first round of testing, we can measure how successful our changes are in conjunction with the other design elements. We were able to mitigate some of the issues that came up in the first round of testing but, with the second round of testing came new feedback. For task 1, we previously performed at a 100% success rate, and we dropped by 10%. In tasks 2 and 3, we performed better.

Methodology

The approach we took was to first implement all of the changes we made based off of the round 1 testing. Following this, we introduced style elements such as color, fonts, and logos. We performed the hi-fi rounds of testing using the same script and tasks/scenarios as the first so the data between each round was comparable. We were able to observe if our stylistic elements work successfully in conjunction with our navigation and layouts.

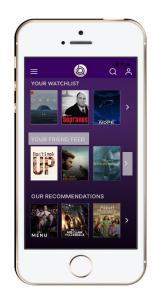

- Some users attempted to click the profile page to view friend related content
- Some mention that to achieve this task, too much clicking is required.
- ► Recommendation
 - Shorten down path to get to friend feed from homepage by
 - Include the "watch with friend" button onto the "Check in with friends"
 - Add friend's profile photos underneath "Friend Feed" to show familiar names and faces to users.

NEXT STEPS AND IMPLEMENTATION

We found that in our second round of testing that we performed worse in task 1 but butter in task 2 and 3. In task 1 the success rate went down by 10% but still remained high, at 90%. Users expressed that the login and account set up process felt long and arduous, informing us that we need to introduce some elements of "delight" into our product that makes the set up process feel more enjoyable.

For task 2 and 3, we performed better with 10% and 20% increase respectively. Our overall success rate for both were 70% and 60% - although these are moderately successful percentages it tells us that we still have points where we can improve. For task 3 in particular, we received an average 3.7 happiness rating - telling us users were able to complete the assigned task but did not find it as enjoyable as the other tasks.

Moving forward, we intend to implement changes we highlighted in our "takeaways" in addition to introducing more features that will help the app stand out and hold a unique position in the market. Some of these features include:

- Building out the "Magic 8 ball" feature, where users receive a randomized show
 / movie providing a delightful and entertaining way to discover new content
- Providing access to "remote watch" so users can connect their profiles with their friends and watch movies or shows remotely together via video chat
- Building out customizable "Watch List" giving users the control to organize the movies and shows they intend to watch
